

3rd Quarter Presentation Projects

Quarter 3 Focus: Persuade, Summarize, and Present a Point-of-View about the 1960s.

Each quarter students give a 1-2 minute presentation in front of the class. Each presentation will be graded on three parts:

Part 1: Content

You have enough interesting information to fill 1-2 minutes.

Part 2: Visual Media

You have something for the class to see.

Part 3: Presentation

You stand in front of the class and clearly present.

Get book approved by teacher. <div style="border: 1px solid black; padding: 5px; text-align: center; margin-top: 10px;"> <p>Teacher Approval</p> </div>	<p>Step 1: Choose Content:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Choose either Fashions, Music, Politics, or Sports of the 1960s.. Pick one that interests you! Get your choice approved by the teacher. <div style="border: 1px solid black; padding: 5px; text-align: center; margin-top: 10px;"> <p>Teacher Approval</p> </div>	<p>Step 1: Choose Content:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Choose one of the controversial things of the 1960s: Vietnam War, the Draft, Civil Rights, or? Get you choice approved by the teacher. <div style="border: 1px solid black; padding: 5px; text-align: center; margin-top: 10px;"> <p>Teacher Approval</p> </div>
<p>Step 2: Research and develop your topic</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Read the ENTIRE book. Group information together. Summarize important points. Create a logical order to present information. 	<p>Step 2: Research and develop your topic</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Research your topic using the Internet, a person you interview, or the library. Use at least 2 sources of information and list them at the end of your presentation. Remember 1-2 minutes only. 	<p>Step 2: Research and develop your topic</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Research both sides of your topic. Pick whether it was something good or bad or unfair or? Argue why your point is the right one! Use at least 2 sources of information and list them at the end of your presentation.
